VSL STUDENTS WIN TOP HONOURS

The annual Premier's VCE Awards recognises the top-performing students in the state. This year, 310 students were recognised at the prestigious award ceremony, including three international students and six students who completed the VCE Vocational Major program with distinction, and 23 Top All-Round VCE High Achievers who achieved study scores of 46 or higher out of 50 in at least five VCE subjects.

Victoria's top performing VCE students received their Premier's VCE Awards during a special ceremony on the 17th July.

ADDITIONAL PREMIER'S VCE AWARDS WINNERS

The selection of the VCE Awards winners is managed by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority. The number of Awards in each study is calculated using the enrolment base in that study. Hence there are more awards in larger studies.

Five of the Award winners were previously profiled in the Term 1 edition of the Family & Staff Bulletin. Here, two of our Premier's Award winners, Rhea Werner (German) and Asia Orsini (Italian), tell us a bit about their time at the VSL.



RHEA WERNER, GERMAN

Studying at the VSL was a perfect choice for me, as I wanted to reconnect with German after not having the chance to formally study or practice it for six years in Australia. My school didn't offer

German, so VSL's incredible teachers, resources, and flexible online mode were ideal. I particularly enjoyed the engaging oral lessons with Katja, who consistently helped me improve my language skills, and I looked forward to the in-person seminars where I could connect with classmates and learn from experienced teachers like Rukmani. The biggest challenge was managing my time between eight VCE subjects, VSL Chinese,

and rowing training, but setting aside Friday afternoons for work and additional prep helped me stay on track. Studying languages opens up fantastic global opportunities and fosters cultural understanding, which is essential in our interconnected world. My advice to younger students is to make the most of in-person opportunities and leverage the expertise of VSL's dedicated teaching staff. In the future, I hope to study Economics and Philosophy in the US and use my German skills in roles like working at a German investment bank or bridging global healthcare sectors.



ASIA ORSINI, ITALIAN

I chose to study at VSL because my school didn't offer Italian as a subject. The most enjoyable part of the experience was the independence it allowed—I could progress at my own

pace without being held back by less motivated classmates. One challenge was that answers to questions weren't always immediate, unlike in a traditional classroom setting. Despite this, studying a language is incredibly valuable; it's essential in today's world and enhances cultural understanding, especially useful when traveling. My advice to younger students is to stay consistent with your studies, whether that means reviewing vocabulary, watching films, or listening to music in the target language. Looking ahead, as I study astrophysics at university, my Italian skills will be a significant asset in finding work in Europe.


COLLINGWOOD TEACHER TRAINING SESSION-PORTUGUESE PRACTICES AND METHODOLOGIES

As part of the Teacher Training Plan by the Coordination of Portuguese Teaching in Australia (CEPE-AU), and in collaboration with the Portuguese Institute of the Orient (IPOR) and with the support of Camões, I.P., the educator, Dr. Bárbara Correio conducted a training session both in-person and online in the state of Victoria.

The session, titled "Practices and Methodologies for PLM and PLH Students in the PLH Classroom," took place on September 7, at the Victorian School of Languages in Collingwood. Susana Teixeira Pinto, the coordinator of CEPE-AU, was present to accompany the training session.

The Co-ordinator of Portuguese Teaching and Area Manager Vanda Matruglio, would like to thank all the teachers from Victoria and NSW for their interest and participation in this annual activity.









DISTANCE EDUCATION

In many ways, Term 3 is one of the busiest for our VCE students and teachers as they consolidate course work, complete SACs and start getting ready for their end of year oral exam. As always, our seminars at the Melbourne Multicultural Hub have been well attended by Year 11 and 12 students for their whole-day face-to-face seminars. Many students even make the long trip from places like Inverloch, the Surf Coast and Horsham to attend the sessions and connect with their peers who love learning and practising language. Seminars have been a vital point of connection for many of our students across their VCE pathway, and no doubt many friendships have been forged that will last well beyond students' time learning with us.

Our webinars have been equally well attended and are a good option for students not able to come to the face-to-face sessions. To encourage connection between students, many of our faculties have run Student Collaboration projects through the worksets in Semester 2. Many of these projects have been facilitated through webinars, and these have allowed our students to work together, take on roles of responsibility and be more prepared for the activities in the following seminars.







Earlier in Term 3, the French Faculty ran an excursion as part of the Art topic and students visited the National Gallery of Victoria, where they viewed and interpreted Impressionist artworks, giving them an insight into history, culture and practice that is critical to the development of their macro skill Viewing. In August, staff from the German Faculty accompanied 20 Years 9, 10 and Accelerated 2 students to the Melbourne International Film Festival to see the movie Winners, a story about Syrian teenagers living in Berlin. The students completed pre-viewing, whilst-viewing and post-viewing tasks and combined the excursion with an all-day face-to-face seminar.

VSL Distance Education was also ably represented by two groups of students at the Model United Nations Conferences for German and Indonesian. While our German team represented Mexico on the topic of protecting the world's oceans, the Indonesian group represented the UK and Northern Ireland on AI and sustainable development. Year 12 Indonesian student, Cameron, said that the team "were able to alleviate our nerves towards the end of the caucus, and it made the day so much more fun. I really recommend MUN, even if you're afraid of public speaking, because you're bound to have an amazing outing."

On the teaching and learning front, our team of teachers continues to work collaboratively with a focus on improving practice through reflection and action research. The focus in Term 3 has been the High Impact Teaching Strategy Effective Questioning and the effect it can have in keeping students engaged in lessons and enjoying their learning.

To qualify for this offer:


- You must be caring for a school age student at your home.
- Must not have an active nbn connection at your home now or in the past 14 days. (Having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility).
- Must live in property that can access the nbn network through a standard connection.
